

Law of Process

One of the most important laws in the Kingdom of God is the Law of Process. While it is closely related to the Law of Seedtime and Harvest, the Law of Process emphasizes what happens during the waiting period. Most believers are comfortable with sowing and excited about reaping, but few understand the purpose of the process in between.

Why is waiting such a significant part of the Christian life? Because waiting is where faith becomes necessary. A God of immediate gratification would require very little faith. Faith is trusting God's Word when you cannot yet see the manifestation. During the process, things are occurring that are often invisible to the natural eye. God is developing character, strengthening conviction, renewing the mind, and establishing roots that can sustain the very thing we are believing Him for. If we remain diligent in His Word and continue standing on who we are in Christ, it is impossible for God's promises to fail. In time, the harvest arrives.

In the business world, some refer to this concept as the law of attraction. While the Kingdom of God operates differently, there is a similar principle at work. When your focus is consumed with pursuing blessings, you often become frustrated. However, when your focus is on seeking God, renewing your mind, and remaining faithful to His Word, blessings have a way of finding you. Jesus said in Matthew 6:33, "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." Notice that we are not commanded to chase things; we are commanded to seek Him.

If we were building a home, the worst thing we could do would be to rush the process. Cutting corners, buying cheap materials, or skipping critical steps may save time initially, but eventually the structure will fail. God is not interested in producing temporary success. He is building something that lasts. The process may seem slow, but every step is preparing a foundation strong enough to support the future He has planned for us.

Scripture is filled with examples of this law. Jesus Himself "increased in wisdom and stature" (Luke 2:52). Joseph experienced the pit before the palace. David learned faithfulness while tending sheep before ruling a nation. Paul spent years in Arabia before fully stepping into his apostolic ministry. None of these seasons were wasted. The process was not a delay of God's purpose; it was preparation for it. If you remain diligent, continue renewing your mind, and stay faithful where God has planted you, you will discover a powerful truth: you are not chasing God's blessings. As you seek Him, those things begin to come to you.
